Frederick Douglass and the Irish February 6, 2 PM

Join the Irish American Heritage Museum and Professor Tim Madigan for an interesting look



into one of America's most famous historical figures. This talk will discuss the life of the great social reformer, statesman and orator Frederick Douglass (1818-1895), with an emphasis on his lecture trip to Ireland as a young man in 1845 and how this influenced his later views on abolition and human rights. In particular, Dr. Madigan will talk about the role which meeting the Irish Emancipator Daniel O'Connell played in his commitment to the cause of human freedom. Dr. Madigan also will

examine how Douglass remains a powerful figure for reconciliation in modern-day Ireland and Northern Ireland, with plaques commemorating him in Cork and Waterford, murals honoring him in Belfast and a statue to him in Dublin -- all cities he spoke at during his lecture series. In the words of President Obama, when he visited Dublin in 2011: "His time here, Frederick Douglass said, defined him not as a color but as a man. And it strengthened the non-violent campaign he would return home to wage."

Tim Madigan is the Director of Irish Studies at St. John Fisher College in Rochester, New York, the city where Douglass lived for over 20 years after his return to America from his trip to Ireland.

Seanachie Evenings Stories with the Sound of Love: Marni Gillard and Lawson February 12, 7 PM Marni Gillard, is a well-known regional storyteller and author of Storyteller, Storyteacher (Ann

Izard Storytellers' Choice Award winner). She is a former English teacher and presently is a Chaplain at St Kateri Tekatawitha School in Schenectady. She is devoted to sharing tales and

helping listeners find the power of stories within themselves. In 2010 she premiered a one-woman show and cantata, Granuaile (Grace O'Malley) the 16th century "Pirate Queen" who challenged the British incursion.

Lawson (Eric Everson (bouzouki) and Hilary Schrauf (Violin) are talented traditional Irish session musicians, who have been playing together for over 15 years. They formed the nucleus of the band for the production of Granuaille and look forward to performing with Marni again. In addition to performing Hilary founded and leads the Old Songs Irish Slow Session and coleads a monthly session in Albany with Eric and friend Fritz Stafford.

Seanachie Eves will run from January through May on the second Friday of each month. The admission cost is as

The Rising of the Moon February 19 & 20, 7 PM

The Irish American Heritage Museum and the Ard Ri Players present Lady Augusta Gregory's



short drama, *The Rising of the Moon*. The play is about the conflicting loyalties of an Irish policeman in the service of the British government searching for an escaped rebel. The time of the events of the piece take place shortly before the 1916 Easter Uprising.

The Rising of the Moon, a one act play by Lady Gregory was composed in about 1904. It was included in her book, *Seven Short Plays* (1909). It was first produced at the Abbey Theatre on March, 1907.

The Rising of the Moon has a great symbolic meaning. The play is about the Irish freedom movement. The Rising of the Moon signifies the rising of the moon of Irish freedom. The dramatist hopes for the freedom of her countrymen from the tyranny of the British rule. The poor Irish people will regain

their liberty. The Britishers will have a mighty down fall. "When the small rise up and big falls down".....then we all change places at the 'The Rising of the Moon'.

This performance is directed and produced by Steven and Diane O'Connor, with direction assistance by Sheila O'Shea. The cast includes local actors Tony Pallone, Ken McBain, Brian McBride Land and Alex Benson. The performance will be preceded by a short lecture about the play's author, Lady Gregory, given by IAHM Board member, Margaret Lasch Carroll. A question and answer period with cast and crew will conclude the evening. Admission is \$5 for members and \$10 for not-yet members.

Cooking Irish February 23, 7 PM

The Irish American Heritage Museum, with the support of the Irish government, is having a year-long Cooking Irish project in 2016 that focuses on the preservation of Irish culture, heritage, and identity through food.

Bob Reilly of the American Kerry Cattle Society will be discussing the Kerry Cow at the

Museum on February 23 at 7PM. Kerry cattle are indigenous to Ireland and are one of the oldest European breeds of cattle. The breed gets its name from the county of Kerry where it was widely popular. The Kerry descends from the ancient, fineboned, black Celtic cattle that occupied this area at the time of Caesar's invasion of Britain.



The American Kerry Cattle Society is a

group of dedicated breeders of purebred, registered Kerry Cattle. All of the animals are direct, recorded descendants of Kerry Cattle imported into Canada in the 1970s. They are part of a larger scheme to conserve Kerry Cattle worldwide.
